## God Knows Your Restlessness

“You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.” — *Saint Augustine*

My dear young friends, those words were written more than 1,600 years ago — and yet they describe *you*.

Many young people today are restless. Not because they don't care — but because they care deeply. Not because they are weak — but because their hearts are alive.

You live in a world full of noise, speed, pressure, and expectations. You are told to succeed, to be perfect, to have everything figured out. And yet, deep inside, many of you are asking:

*Who am I really?*

*Does my life matter?*

*Is God real for me — or just an idea?*

*Is there more than this?*

Augustinian spirituality begins with this truth: **Your restlessness is not a problem to be fixed — it is a longing to be listened to.** God Himself planted that longing in your heart.

## **Restlessness Is a Holy Place**

Augustine's life itself mirrors the journey of many young people. He searched for happiness in success, pleasure, ambition, and recognition. Yet nothing satisfied him completely. It did not give him an inner peace.

Sound familiar?

Youth today experience similar restlessness:

- Pressure to succeed
- Fear of failure
- Anxiety about the future
- Questions about faith and identity
- Desire to be seen, heard, and loved

Augustinian spirituality does not condemn restlessness. Instead, it **honors it.**

Restlessness is not a weakness; it is a sign that the heart is alive. Augustine teaches us that restlessness becomes destructive only when it is directed toward things that cannot satisfy the deepest longings of the heart.

For young people, this is liberating. It means:

- Doubt is not the enemy of faith
- Questions are not sins
- Struggles are not failures

Rather, they are invitations to deeper truth. Do not silence your questions. Bring them to God. God is not threatened by your restlessness.

Scripture gives words to this experience: "My soul thirsts for God, for the living God."  
(Psalm 42:2)

Augustine teaches us something very important:

The problem is not that we desire too much — the problem is that we sometimes desire **too little**, or the wrong things.

When we try to fill an infinite heart with temporary things, the heart remains empty.

So hear this clearly:

- Your questions are not sins
- Your doubts are not failures
- Your longing is not rebellion

**Your restlessness is a sign that you were made for more.**

God is not disappointed by your searching.  
God is already walking with you in it.

## **God Is Closer Than You Think (Interiority)**

Augustine once said: “Do not go outside yourself; return within. In the inner person dwells truth.”

One of the greatest challenges for youth today is **constant noise**:

- Social media
- Endless comparison
- Pressure to perform
- Fear of missing out

Young people are constantly forming an identity based on external validation: likes, followers, approval, achievements.

Augustinian spirituality calls youth to **interiority**. This does not mean escaping the world, but learning to listen to the heart.

Interiority involves:

- Silence
- Prayer
- Self-knowledge
- Honesty before God

Augustine discovered that God was not far away, but closer to him than he was to himself. For youth, this is a powerful truth: God is not found only in Church activities or religious rules, but in the depths of their lived experience.

Many young people know how to post, scroll, and succeed — but do not know how to be still.

Yet Jesus says: “The kingdom of God is within you.” (Luke 17:21) Augustine discovered something life-changing: God was not far away. God was closer to him than his own breath.

This is the heart of Augustinian spirituality: **God dwells within you.**

Not just when you are holy.  
Not just when you are strong.  
Not just when you have everything together.

God meets you in your real life — your fears, your wounds, your questions. Prayer is not pretending. Prayer is honesty. The Catechism says: “Prayer is the encounter of God’s thirst with ours.” (CCC 2560)

God is not waiting for you to fix yourself. God is already waiting *within you*.

## **You Were Not Meant to Walk Alone (Community)**

Augustinian spirituality is never individualistic. Augustine never believed in a faith lived alone. He built communities of friendship — people who searched for God together, argued together, prayed together, and loved together.

Augustine believed that no one comes to God alone. His religious communities were built on friendship, shared searching, and common prayer.

Youth today deeply long for community:

- Not institutions, but relationships
- Not judgment, but belonging
- Not perfection, but authenticity

The Church sometimes struggles to offer this, especially when young people experience exclusion, misunderstanding, or lack of listening.

Augustinian community is:

- United in mind and heart
- Honest about weakness
- Centred on shared love for God

Such communities allow young people to say: “I don’t have it all together, but I don’t walk alone.”

This challenges the Church to move:

- From control to accompaniment
- From answers to listening
- From uniformity to unity

**Key insight:** Young people stay where they feel known, valued, and needed.

The early Church lived this vision: “All who believed were together.” (Acts 2:44)

Young people today often leave the Church not because they stop believing — but because they feel alone.

Augustinian community says:

- You don’t have to be perfect to belong
- You don’t have to pretend to be holy
- You don’t have to walk alone

True community is not about judgment. It is about accompaniment. Pope Francis says: “Young people want to be listened to.” (*Christus Vivit*)

An Augustinian community is a place where you can say: “I am still searching — and that’s okay.” Where hearts are united, not because they are the same, but because they are turned toward God together.

## Love Is the Key to Freedom

Saint Augustine famously said: “Love, and do what you will.”

This does not mean: *do whatever you want*. It means: when love is right, your life becomes free. Jesus teaches the same: “Remain in my love.” (John 15:9)

The world often tells young people:

- Love is possession
- Love is pleasure without responsibility
- Love is about self-interest

Augustine teaches something radically different:

True love leads you out of yourself.

True love orders your life.

True love gives meaning to sacrifice.

The Church teaches: “The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes.” (CCC 1733)

This matters for:

- Relationships
- Sexuality
- Vocations
- Justice and service

Young people are not afraid of commitment — they are afraid of meaningless commitment.

Augustinian spirituality shows that **love gives direction to life.**

## Young People and the Church — A Call to Hope

Many young people struggle with the Church: I struggle with it too. But I remain why?

- Scandals
- Hypocrisy
- Feeling unheard

Augustine knew this reality well. He believed the Church is holy because of Christ — and wounded because of human sin.

Scripture says: "We hold this treasure in earthen vessels." (2 Corinthians 4:7)

Vatican II reminds us: The Church is "always in need of purification." (*Lumen Gentium*, 8)

Young people, hear this clearly: **You are not just the future of the Church — you are the Church now.**

Your questions purify the Church. Your honesty renews the Church.  
Your faith — even when fragile — matters.

Pope Francis says: "You are the now of God." (*Christus Vivit*)

Augustinian spirituality gives you permission to:

- Love the Church honestly
- Stay without pretending
- Help renew it with courage

## **A Home for Restless Hearts**

Jesus says: "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest."  
(Matthew 11:28)

Rest does not mean having everything figured out. Rest means knowing to whom you belong.

Augustinian spirituality offers you:

- Meaning for your restlessness
- Depth in a superficial world
- Community in loneliness
- Hope in a wounded Church

Let these words be spoken over your life:

**Your search is holy.**

**Your heart was made for God.**

**Your restlessness is a path, not a problem.**

Let us end with Saint Augustine's prayer:

"Late have I loved you, Beauty ever ancient, ever new. You were within me,  
but I was outside." May your restless heart learn not to run from God — but to rest in Him.
